

MID-ULSTER FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION

BOB RADCLIFFE CUP COMPETITION

RULES

Name

1 The Cup shall be called "Bob Radcliffe Memorial Cup."

Annual Competition

2 The Competition shall be annual and open to **Intermediate** member clubs of the Association and such guest clubs as the Mid Ulster FA Council may invite.

Entries Etc.

3 Entries must be made on the Official Affiliation Card and be received by the Secretary of the Association not later than the **20th July** of each year, and must be accompanied by an entry fee decided annually by the Council.

- (i) The following must be clearly stated on the Card.
- (ii) Whether ground is shared and, if so, with whom and who has primacy
- (iii) Whether the ground is public or private
- (iv) Situation of ground
- (v) Colours of Club shirts, shorts and socks
- (vi) Name, Address and email address of Secretary

Ineligible Players

4 An ineligible player shall be a player who has

- i Played in the current or previous 3 seasons in a senior international match
- ii Played in a Senior Inter League match during the current season
- iii Played more than **6** Senior Matches during the current season
- iv Competed in a National Association Cup tie match for an English, Scottish or Welsh club during the current season
- v Played in the winning team in the final tie of a National Association Senior Cup competition during the previous season, except a player who has played in a winning team which had qualified from an Intermediate Competition.

Note – Should it be necessary in any season for the final to be postponed or to be rearranged by the council for a date other than that originally fixed, players eligible to play on the original date shall also be eligible for the re-arranged date.

Qualification of Players

5 Players will be eligible to play in the Bob Radcliffe Cup provided that on the date of the tie they are eligible to play for their own club in its League Competition.

To be eligible to participate in the Bob Radcliffe Cup all players must be registered by their clubs, in accordance with the IFA Professional Game Player Registration Regulations.

For the avoidance of any doubt to be eligible to play in this competition a player must also be eligible to participate for his club in the relevant league competition and must have been registered during one of the two professional game registration periods. Clubs who play in a purely amateur league competition and who are permitted to register players to participate in such purely amateur competition outside the above registration periods shall not be permitted to play any player so registered in this competition until the commencement of the subsequent registration period.

No player who is registered by his club after 31st January shall be eligible to participate in that same season.

Limitations of Qualifications

6 No individual shall be allowed to play for more than one competing team **in the same season.**

7 Notwithstanding anything in any Rule, if the Mid Ulster FA Council in the case of the Bob Radcliffe Cup, have any doubt at any time, and whether arising out of a protest or otherwise, as to the qualification of any player taking part in the competition, they shall have power to call upon such player and / or Club to which he belongs, or for which he played, to prove that he is qualified according to the rules, and failing satisfactory proof, they shall disqualify such player and shall remove the Club from the Competition, and impose such other penalty as they may think fit.

Competition Format

8 The names of the Clubs approved for the competition shall be placed in one lot, or lots, as the Council may determine.

Byes may be given

The Council may draw subsequent round or rounds before the winners of the previous rounds have been declared, and the winners according to such draw shall compete against each other as in the previous round. The Council shall have power to exempt any number of Clubs from any number of rounds, and byes may be given so that four Clubs shall compete in the Semi-Finals.

Draw after Bye

9 In the event of a club getting a bye in any of the drawings, the Council at the subsequent drawing, shall first draw a Club to play against it from the lot, the two shall again be put in the ballot-box and again drawn, and the club first out of the box shall have choice of ground (subject to the conditions detailed in rule 10): but the Council may so arrange that four clubs compete in the Semi-Finals.

Method of Drawing

10 a) In principle the club that is first drawn in the ballot shall play at their registered home venue in all rounds prior to the semi-finals.

b) The first drawn club may forfeit home advantage with the agreement of their opponents and in such circumstances written confirmation of same must be notified

to the **competition** Secretary by both clubs not later than 5 days following the date of the relevant draw.

c) Each club entering the competition should play their home games on their registered home ground (unless otherwise directed in exceptional circumstances by the Council, Health and Safety authorities or the PSNI). Any match expenses incurred in staging a game at a neutral venue, in any round prior to the semi-finals and final, will be the responsibility of the club that was first drawn in the ballot.

d) Should a club having a registered home ground which, for whatever reason be unavailable (excluding inclement weather conditions) be drawn at home, they must travel to the ground of their opponents. Any match expenses incurred in staging a game in any round prior to the semi-finals and final will be the responsibility of the club that was first drawn in the ballot.

e) Immediately after each drawing, the Secretary shall intimate to each of the Clubs drawn, the name of the Club it is drawn against, and the time within which the Tie is to be played.

Semi-finals and Final

11 The venue for the Semi-Finals and Final shall be chosen by the Council. The Council may permit the match or matches to be played at the registered home venue of either of the participating teams. Should any club participate in the final tie at their registered ground no ground rent will be payable.

Clubs failing to play

12 Any club refusing or failing to play the club against which it has been drawn on the date fixed by the Council and without sufficient reasons for doing so, shall be adjudged to have lost the match, and otherwise dealt with as the Council may determine.

When postponed games must be played

In the event of a tie being postponed in any round prior to the semi finals the clubs must forthwith arrange to meet on or before the following Saturday. In the event of a match not taking place on or before the second Saturday the club which was first drawn away will have choice of venue for the match to take place on or before the subsequent Saturday and if not played on this day must be played at the same venue on or before the following Saturday. In the event of the match not taking place on the second attempt of the club which was first drawn away the tie will revert from the following Saturday to alternate weeks at the 'Home' and 'Away' venues. In case of protested ties the Council shall decide the dates and venues. Should either club refuse to compete, the club shall be removed from the competition and otherwise dealt with as the Council may determine.

In the event of the postponement of a Semi-Final or Final Tie the date, time, and venue shall be determined by Council in all circumstances.

Substitutes

13 A club may, at its discretion, use three substitute players at any time in any match except to replace a player who has been suspended from the game by the referee. The substitutions shall only be made when play is stopped for any reason

and the referee has given permission. The maximum number of substitutes permitted to be nominated by each side is five and must be nominated prior to the commencement of the match.

Players must wear Registered Colours

14 The players in each competing team must wear the registered colours of the Club for which they are playing except when opposing teams have similar colours, in which case the Club on whose ground the match is played shall change. In all other cases the Council shall decide which team shall change. The colours of the Club shall be taken to be the colours of the shirt, shorts and socks as registered with the Association. A goalkeeper must wear shirt, shorts and socks of different colour, provided that said shirt, shorts and socks is of a colour distinctive from that of his opponents.

In a tie played on a neutral ground, where opposing teams have similar colours, both teams shall change unless they are agreed that only one do so. Referees shall have power to instruct a player to change shirt, shorts and socks if he considers the colour not quite distinctive from that of his opponents, and the Referee shall have power to deal with any player refusing to comply with his instruction.

Duration of Match / Extra Time

15 In the event of any match resulting in a draw extra time of ten minutes each way shall be played, and should the score be equal at the end of this period of extra time, the match shall be decided by the taking of kicks from the penalty mark in accordance with the conditions approved by International FA Board

Referee and Assistant Referees

16 The competing clubs, in all but the Semi-Finals and Final shall appoint the Assistant Referees. The Council shall appoint the Referee. The Council may also appoint a 4th Official if deemed necessary. Referees fees shall be fixed annually by the Council.

Protests

17 (a) Protests and appeals must be received by the Secretary of the Association per special delivery letter bearing post mark within **two** days after the cause of protest or appeal accompanied by a deposit of **£100**

Copies must be sent to the Club protested against

(b) A copy of the protest or appeal must also be sent by special delivery to the Club protested against. The certificate of posting of such special delivery must bear date stamp within two days after the cause of the protest or appeal and shall be sole proof of date of posting.

Objection to Ground

18 Any objection to ground, goal-posts or ball must be lodged in writing by the Captain for the day with the Referee before the game has started, and the Referee shall have power to have such objections made right before the game starts. ***

Referee to inspect Ground

In case of unfavourable weather conditions a Referee, to be appointed by the Association, shall inspect the ground not less than three hours previous to the scheduled time of kick-off or earlier if requested by the home club, and shall immediately give his decision as to the fitness of ground for play. No game shall be postponed without an inspection by a referee appointed by the Association, who shall take due cognizance of local advice and the travelling supporters. In the event of a Referee not arriving at the ground by the time of kick off the match shall be postponed and the clubs must agree to re-arrange the match in accordance with rule 12.

Intimidation by Spectators

19 When it can be proven that the partisans of the Club which has the choice of ground, systematically interfere with the play of opposing Clubs, by using abusive, foul or obscene language or inciting the home players to use violence to their opponents, on the application of the Club which is to play against such Club, the Council shall have the power to order the match to be played on another ground.

Agreement for Cup

20 When the winning Club shall have been declared, the Secretary of the Association shall hand the Cup to its representatives on receiving a document to the following effect, and subscribed by three persons whose names shall be previously submitted to, and approved of by the Council of the Association: – We, A.B., Chairman of the X.Y.Z. Club, and C.D. and E.F., members of and representing the said Club, which has now been declared to have won the Mid-Ulster Football Association Challenge Cup, and the said Cup having been delivered to us by J.K., Secretary of said Association, do hereby, on behalf of said Club, and individually and collectively engage to return the same to the said J.K., Secretary of the Association for the time being one month before the final in like good order and condition No party, other than the Secretary of the Association, is authorised to have engraving or similar works undertaken on the trophy.

Division of Receipts

21 (a) In all Competition matches, with the exception of the Semi-final and Final Ties, the receipts (including Stands), after payment of the costs pertaining to match officials, shall be kept by the home club.

Division of Receipts: Semi-Finals and Final

(b) In each Semi-Final and the Final the Competing clubs and the Council shall equally share gate receipts after deduction of all match expenses. In case the expenses in Semi-Finals exceed the receipts, the deficit shall be taken from the Final tie receipts, same being considered expenses of the match.

Medals or Badges

22 The Association will present medals or other mementoes to the winners and runners - up in the competition each season.

Alterations to Rules

23 (a) The Council shall have power to deal with any matter not provided for in these rules.

(b) In all cases under these Rules Sunday shall not be taken into account in computing the time required in any matter arising out of these Rules.

(c) These rules shall not be altered, annulled, or added to, until after the Final Tie has been played.

Referees Team Sheet

10. The secretary or other responsible official of each competing club shall enter the full names of players on the referee's card and must certify the accuracy of the information supplied. Any club not completing the referee's card in the prescribed manner shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £20.00. It shall be at the Council's discretion whether or not such club should be allowed to remain in the competition. The referee's card may be inspected by the secretary or other responsible official of either of the competing teams at the conclusion of the match or on application to the secretary of the Association.
